The Capes HOA Plant List

GUIDELINES

All landscaping shall be natural, indigenous vegetation suitable to The Capes. Nonindigenous in-ground plantings of a species not listed must be approved by the Landscape Committee. Plants/species which appear on this list are pre-approved.

The Capes has established "view corridors" to maintain views of the ocean and bay. Generally, these view corridors are between the homes and over the roof of homes that are closest to the ocean. In some cases, the view corridor is north or south and involves landscaping that is in the front of homes. If you are not sure if landscaping on your lot may involve a view corridor, please contact the Landscape Committee for guidance.

The Capes CC&Rs protect ocean and bay views (6.11*), and it is important that landscaping be continuously maintained to be compliant for neighboring views. The Landscape Committee generally recommends that trees and shrubs be maintained to a height of 10-feet or less to preserve view corridors.

^{*} CC&R 6.11 - No landscaping shall be installed by a Lot Owner which materially interferes with another Lot Owner's ocean or bay view and no landscaping shall be allowed that can grow so as to materially interfere with another Lot Owner's ocean or bay view. Disputes regarding whether landscaping violates this requirement shall be resolved by the Landscape Committee.
